Working Together - School Collaboration

Our 4 schools enjoy a great deal of collaboration and have been developing our links further this term. Firstly, all four schools joined together for a professional development meeting led by Jen McIlveen looking at Courageous Advocacy. Working together, sharing ideas and seeing each other's schools is always a great way of learning.

On the week beginning 17th October we had our first worship collaboration of the year. This was a series of online worship, one each day, led

Finally, on 4th November we had our sports afternoon. This was hosted by St Oswald's and consisted of a football tournament on the field and a netball tournament on the playground. All 4 schools played each other

Courageous Advocacy has become a well-known phrase in our church schools over the last five years, and it was a delight to be able to work with this group of schools to dig deeper into what the phrase really means. Going beyond the charitable work of the school, it seeks to help children identify and find ways to tackle the injustice they see in the world around them, locally and further afield. As SIAMS changes its framework in 2023, Courageous Advocacy remains a vital part of what it means to be an effective church school. National NPQ pilot - an exciting opportunity for Chester Diocesan small rural schools.

We have been given a very exciting opportunity to be involved in a special pilot for small rural Church of England schools.

The national Church of England team have secured some funding from the DfE to offer the NPQ suite to small rural church of England schools. In discussion with the DfE they explained that the take up from small rural schools for the NPQs was minimal because of the difficulty in paying for and getting cover for staff to be out of school. They therefore proposed an alternative which would be the offer of the NPQs remotely and as twilights so there would be no need for staff to be out of school. The full suite of NPQs will be on offer (apart from the new EYFS and literacy NPQs) so this includes NPQEL, NPQH, NPQSL, NPQLT, NPQLTD and NPQLBC – details can be found here https://www.cefel.org.uk/npqoverview/

We are very fortunate to have the opportunity to be involved in this pilot as one of a small number of dioceses and so would encourage you to speak to staff and consider if you have any staff that would benefit from this opportunity to gain an NPQ that is fully funded and would not require any time out of school.

Also every small school taking part would receive a payment direct from DfE of £200 per person enrolled. All of the courses start on 1st March

Our numbers are very limited and so if you are interested please contact <u>Sue Noakes</u> by 16th December with the names of staff and NPQs of interest in your school.

Admissions for Aided schools and academies



Our admissions guidance has been updated following some adjudicator rulings that have been made this year. The latest guidance can be found here https://www.chester.anglican.org/schools/school-support/admissions.php

Please ensure:

- Looked After Children also includes those who were in care overseas
- A clear definition of worship attendance, frequency and time frame with clear cut off. This definition must also be in your Supplementary Information Form (SIF)
- If you have criteria that includes attendance at worship you must have a Supplementary Information Form that allows for a tick box to confirm attendance (not a letter from clergy)
- The waiting list is kept until the 31st December and not the end of the autumn term.
- If you have a section on 'summer born children' rename to children educated outside their age group to include those who wish to start school early and those who wish to delay for reasons (e.g. medical) which is not to do with being summer born
- Make sure the map of any parishes is included with the policy

Please remember

- If there are any changes you must consult for a minimum of 6 weeks before the 31st January
- You will need to 'determine' the arrangements for 2024 by 28th February 2023 and send a copy to the DBE.

Thank you to all who attended the Headteacher and Senior Leaders Conference on 25th November 2022.





Our Reception and Key Stage 1 pupils visited the cenotaph in Crowton to lay the school wreath and reflect upon our learning about remembrance.








Dodleston



The children and community were invited to support the BBC's Rickshaw Relay Rides Again as part of Children in Need. Matt Baker MBE and Quinlan Dunne, 18, rode through the village of Dodleston as they completed their 38 mile journey from Warrington to Wrexham.

Children enjoyed making posters, learning about charities in the local areas which are funded by Children in Need, meeting Pudsey and cheering the rickshaw team. Quinlan took some of the posters and banners the children made as a special keepsake. It was a very special day for all.

Classes 3 and 4 took part in Chester's response to Cop 27 and attended Chester Cathedral's Children Eco Conference. They listened to a representative from Green Peace and Steve Hughes, the founder of Chester super trees project. The children then took part in 3 workshops led by Chester University, Chester Zoo and Cheshire Wildlife Trust. Children came back with so many ideas of how sustainable changes can be made.



Hartford High



Earlier this month we took our Ethos Ambassadors to our partner church, St John's in Hartford for a Schools' Remembrance Service. All 15 students took part, leading prayers, bible readings and poetry and laying crosses along the paths for the fallen. The 'Last Post' and 'Revielle', wonderfully played by one of our students, Anna, made for a very moving service. Anna also represented the school by playing for Compass Minerals Remembrance Service in Northwich.

Once again, we are thrilled with the generosity of our students who, despite difficult circumstances, made a tremendous contribution to the

Mid Cheshire Foodbank following our Harvest Assembly.

We were lucky enough to perform in our dance show 'Candlelight' at the Grange Theatre in Hartford. We were extremely nervous as we knew it was a sold-out event with an audience of 233 people, including our families and teachers. The theme of our show was women empowerment as we wanted to raise awareness about how the lives of women have changed dramatically over the last 100 years, and how we have lots of women to thank for the lives we are able to live today. Our school choir and feminist group helped link literature and music to our theme. One of our dances was about cyber bullying which supports our school theme this week. We used narrative about social media accounts and processes and linked



them to movement. Our group of 7 girls felt motivated by this dance and wanted to raise awareness to younger girls in our school who have experienced or are experiencing bullying. At the end of the dance, we showed two people who have come together to unite as one to overcome bullying, to encourage girls to reach out for just one friend, which hopefully will inspire our younger generation.

Heswall St Peter's

We have had a really fantastic start to the year at St Peter's. Our focus of the first day of each half term is one of our PETERS values (Pride, Effort, Teamwork, Empathy, Respect, Spirituality) During our Pride values day, we considered The Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector.

In R.E. we have been exploring a range of topics, including the Kingdom of God and Incarnation. Our EYFS classes were able to make their first school visit to Heswall Parish, which was really exciting!

We began our second half term with our Effort Values day, focussing on Colossians 3:23 "Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men,". The children really enjoy our values days and they are a wonderful way to start each half term on a Christian footing.

Our amazing Ethos team have been teaching the other pupils all about Courageous Advocacy. This year, we have signed up to the Global Neighbours award, run by Christian Aid. To launch this initiative, our Ethos Group led a whole school worship, in front of staff, parents and governors! The children did an excellent job of sharing what being a courageous advocate means, and finished the worship with a bake sale too!



Our partnership with the Rock of Joy Trust, Uganda is very important to us. Already this year we have collected over 100 pairs of school shoes to send out with the team of young people who will be visiting Uganda next summer. We've enjoyed exchanging letters and prayers with the children there and

successfully organised two second hand book sales, raising over £300.

It has been a wonderful first term so far and we are looking forward to more RE visits, child-led worships, values, courageous advocacy and celebrations as the year progresses!

Hoole



We commemorated Armistice Day with a very special worship. It was wonderful to welcome friends from All Saints' Church, the local community and the Belong Care Village in Chester to join with us in remembering servicemen and women who have given their lives for our country.

To commemorate the fortieth anniversary of the Falklands War, the service focused on Simon Weston and the Sir Galahad military boat. We talked about Simon Weston who had been very badly injured but showed perseverance and determination to recover in order to help other people

and make a difference in the world around him.

At the end of the service, children laid poppies on our wall of remembrance. Many pupils had written messages of remembrance on their poppies, showing how they had reflected on the sacrifice of the fallen. Visitors were also welcomed to lay poppies and many did this with an escort from our youngest children in Reception Class.

Later in the afternoon, older children were visited by Chris Caroe, a veteran of the Falklands War. Mr Caroe joined us from an



appearance on BBC Breakfast News that morning. Mr Caroe spoke to pupils about his experiences and his feelings on Armistice Day. Pupils were enthralled to listen to Mr Caroe and his first-hand account of conflict. I feel so fortunate that we are able to offer children experiences like this which support them in becoming tolerant and responsible citizens of the future.

The children reflected on the day's events. I have shared some of their reflections below:

"It's not all about war and conquest. It is about being thankful for the things you have."

"This taught me to be thankful for the small things and how even though they were the enemy, the soldiers still cared for the Argentinian prisoners."

"It has made me think differently about not only being thankful for the British soldiers but also for all of the others."

"It showed me that friendship helps you to get on in life."

"It has made me realise how special Remembrance Day is for everyone."

"It inspires me to help people and team work with loyal friends."

"This made me even more thankful for every person who fought for our country."

"I learnt to be thankful and live life to the fullest and maybe the impossible may be possible."

Our school continues to be a Rights Respecting School. We are now preparing for the Silver Award accreditation, in the New Year.

As part of the learning, the school is developing a new display promoting the UN Convention on the Rights for the Child. A beautiful floor book is used to collate evidence of how the school is working to strengthen their understanding of the Rights for the child and how the school can develop how much they appreciate them.

Staff have gathered how the language of the rights respecting approach shapes a positive learning environment.

Article of the month for the school is Article 17 – Every child has the right to reliable information from the mass media. Television, radio, newspapers and other media should provide information that children can understand.

This is a focus through Picture News, Newsround, Children In Need and Childline. The school will take part in Outright 2022-23 this year on Friday 18th November.

At our school as part of our new collective worship programme, we have begun a Key Stage 2 Window on the World worship. During worship the children sit in their house and explore a news item from the week. The children give thoughtful and reflective answers to questions which leads to a time of prayer.

In November, we have been enjoying following the England matches in the World Cup. However, we looked at some new

stories from Amnesty International and have learnt about some of the human rights issues in Qatar.

In order for Qatar to host the World Cup in the desert, they have had to undertake a huge building programme to create stadiums. The government have chosen to use migrant workers from countries like Nepal as builders. Unfortunately, there have been many human rights violations. The children learnt that workers often do not receive the wages they were promised and do not have adequate housing, food or clean water. Should they wish to leave or visit family back home, they can't as their passports have been withheld. In addition, health and safety checks have not taken place meaning there have been many accidents leading to life changing injuries and even deaths.

Our House Captains were so passionate about the situation that they decided they wanted to write to the English FA expressing their love of football, but not at the expense of equality for all. They have written letters to Mark Bullingham (CEO of the FA) and Prince William (President of the FA) speaking out on behalf of the migrant workers.
