### **Lifetime Achievement Award**

Many congratulation to Ian 'Mac' McDougall, who has been awarded the Lifetime Achievement award in the TES National School Awards. Mac will be known to many of our headteachers, having previously been headteacher at St Berteline's CE Primary in Runcorn and has also been one of our diocesan consultants for a number of years. The nomination was made by his previous colleagues, including current headteacher, Julie Barron, who wished to acknowledge his



outstanding contribution to the school over a number of decades, The award summary stated,

Judges were highly impressed with the culture McDougall had fostered in the school, commenting that it "oozes loveliness" and that its happy atmosphere was a tribute to what he had achieved there. McDougall set up St Berteline's in his early thirties. He built the school up from 22 pupils to 300, establishing a vibrant community with a strong focus on the importance of outdoor learning. He helped pupils to see the value of taking care of their environment, putting a stop to vandalism in the 1970s and 1980s, as well as visiting pupils' homes to ensure they came into school if there were difficulties. He led trips to the Lake District and whole-school outings to the beach alongside parents, with groups squeezed into double-decker buses.....Colleagues describe his enthusiasm for learning as infectious, and he regularly incorporated performances on his guitar in his humorous assemblies. His commitment to high expectations ensured that the school has continued to be inclusive and supportive of all pupils. The positivity of St Berteline's culture is to his credit and for this reason, the lifetime achievement award is richly deserved.

Mac continues to work with the Diocese, creating the Y6 Leavers' Service and has led the worship group for these services at the Cathedral and at St. Mary's, Astbury prior to the pandemic. In his retirement, Mac has also continued to provide support and lead worship at his local church school of Huxley Church of England Primary. On behalf of the DBE, we wish to extend our own congratulations and appreciation to such a worthy recipient. # **CDAT to deliver the new NPQs**

We are delighted that our Diocesan MAT, Chester Diocesan Academies Trust (CDAT), has been selected as one of the delivery partners working with the Church of England Foundation for Educational Leadership (CEFEL), to offer the revised suite of National Professional Qualifications to teachers and school leaders from September 2021. Being selected as a delivery partner by CEFEL is a real achievement for CDAT, and an affirmation of the quality of leadership and school improvement expertise within the trust.

The NPQs are the nationally recognised suite of qualifications for teachers and school leaders at all levels - from those who want to develop expertise in high quality teaching practice to those leading multiple schools across a trust. They have been significantly redesigned this year, with three specialist NPQs introduced to replace the old 'middle leader' level. CDAT's role will be to lead on the delivery of two of these programmes – the National Professional Qualification in Leading Teaching (NPQLT) and the National Professional Qualification in Leading Teacher Development (NPQLTD) – while supporting partners in the region to deliver the rest of the NPQ suite.

# **Admissions**

Important information for Voluntary Aided schools and academies – immediate action to be taken.

As indicated in previous bulletins a new admissions code is due to come into force on 1<sup>st</sup> September. The draft code is currently laid before parliament and is expected to have final agreement by 1<sup>st</sup> July. We will update our guidance appropriately with most changes coming into effect for admission arrangements and process for 2022 and 2023 however there is an immediate change required for both 2021 and 2022 admission policies with regards to Looked After Children. From 1<sup>st</sup> September Paragraph 1.7 of the new Code will require that highest priority is given to "looked after children and all previously looked after children, including those children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted".

The wording used in the code that can be cut and paste into your arrangements is: Looked after children and all previously looked after children, including those children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order).

This new provision will necessitate variations to determined admission arrangements to take effect from 1 September 2021. Admission authorities will need to vary their admission arrangements for 2021/22 (which would have been determined by 15 February 2020) and their admission arrangements for 2022/23 (which would have been determined by 15 February 2021). Without these variations, admission arrangements that have already been determined will no longer comply with the Code from this date. This means it will be in place for any in-year admissions for 2021 and may impact waiting lists if any children on the list come under this category.

Therefore, the DfE expect admission authorities to hold a meeting sometime between now and 31 August 2021 to determine the necessary variations to admission arrangements for 2021/2022 and 2022/2023. Variations will be conditional on the Code passing through its Parliamentary process (i.e. a date on or around 1 July 2021). If any variations are agreed before then, they must be expressed to be conditional on the Code passing through Parliament (as set out in the Board minutes). As this is a requirement there is no need to consult or request a variation through the schools adjudicator. All such variations should come into effect on 1 September 2021.

### Other amendments

Other changes to the code that do not require variation but will need action to be taken include:

• In-year admissions – LAs may co-ordinate in-year admissions and admission authorities have the choice as to whether or not to use the LA. Schools must inform the LA by 1<sup>st</sup> October this year and 1<sup>st</sup> August in every subsequent year whether or not they are going to use the LA's co-ordination scheme. If schools choose not to then the application process must be published on the school website with all relevant forms required. All schools must publish on their website by the 31<sup>st</sup> October 2021 and 31<sup>st</sup> August every subsequent year how in-year admissions will be managed.

• Schools must inform the LA of any places in their schools regardless of whether they use the LA to co-ordinate in-year admissions or not.

- Parents must be notified of the outcome of the application ideally within 10 school days but no more than 15 school days (a reminder here that unless there is a place available with one application and the child must be admitted decisions on admissions must not be undertaken by a single individual but by the governing board or admissions committee).
- There are changes to the Fair Access Protocol which means that it may only be used where it has been difficult to place a vulnerable and/or hard to place child (this now comes with clear definitions) in-year. No school is expected to take a disproportionate amount of such children.
- All admission authorities must participate in the Fair Access Protocol once agreed.

Alongside the changes suggested by the Church of England Education office following the OSA exercise last year (highlighted in the previous bulletin) and the new code this is a good opportunity to reflect and review on your policy for 2023; to ensure it fits your vision and the community you serve. Many policies have continued as they as they have been inherited but may not serve your current context. Considering this now gives time for the required consultation period in the autumn term. This is also a reminder that policies should be sent to the DBE **before** they go out for consultation. This is a requirement of the code but is also a good opportunity for the policy to be checked to ensure it is compliant.

Everyone was delighted to open the new open-air Theatre. A warm welcome was given to Matt Baker who helped perform a song written by the children during lockdown.





### **Hoole C of E Primary School**

This happens annually as a gift from the Church to the children and is always a lovely celebration.




All staff and pupils would like to extend their thanks to Reverend David and the Church Community, it was wonderful to be able to hold the presentation in St Christopher's.

chant 'Save our bees, they pollinate our trees'."






There has been a lot of bee life-saving going on at lunch and playtime with some remarkable success.

The magical space is where the books look like 'Sweeties in a sweetie shop rather than Brussel Sprouts' - Cressida.


The children had a magical experience that will stay with them for a long time.
