# **Eco Lent Calendar**

Green Anglicans have created a Lenten calendar called **My Little Bits of Good**, available here.

Their aim is to recognize that this lent we are all on our individual journeys, but as we perform our "little" actions where we are, when added together makes a significant impact. For this Lenten journey we have small actions that we can perform in our everyday lives.

# **Reflecting Through Lent**

How often do we stop to wonder why it was, that right before his ministry began, Jesus took himself into the desert for 40 days and nights?

Forty was a traditional number for spiritual discipline, devotion, and preparation in the Bible. Moses, Elijah, the Israelite spies, even the Ninevites are all examples of this in the Old Testament. During his time in the wilderness, Jesus revealed his identity as the Son of God and the kind of ministry that he was to undertake – something radically different to what had been before...coming to serve, and lead with authenticity.





You may want to watch this <u>short video</u> as part of your worship time or even to start or end a staff meeting during Lent.

As we approach the season of Lent this year, many will undertake the discipline of giving something up. What if, this year, we were to take up a time to be still each day – to reflect on who we are, our Christian vision and identity as a school, as

authentic leaders, as those in service of our communities? How might that prepare us for new and exciting times ahead?



This a great opportunity as a whole school to pause in the busy pace of life, to stop, to better understand our own identities as children of God and refocus on our vision going forward. How might you involve your families in this opportunity? Or strengthen your partnership with the local church?

<u>Prayer spaces in Schools</u> have some great ideas for creative reflection spaces, both inside and outside, as do the <u>Joshua Centre</u>, <u>Spiritual Child</u>, <u>Blackburn Diocese</u> and this year Gloucester Diocese have introduced a new resource to their collection; <u>Experience Lent</u>, <u>Engage Worship</u> have a series of Lent images that would be a great addition to your newsletters home, or as stimulus for reflective spaces or worship. Whatever you choose to do, whether large scale or small, we pray that this will be a time of refreshing spiritual growth, for you, and your schools.

# **News from Schools**

## **Acton C of E Primary School**



Have recently written letters to their partner school in Ghana. They told them all about their school and what a normal day in Acton is like. Pupils asked them lots of questions as they wondered what it is like to live and go to school in Africa. They are now awaiting letters back from the Ahafo and District Education School in Ghana.

#### **Bollington St John's C of E Primary School**

Class 4 visited the Yeshurun Synagogue, linked to our learning about Judaism. The children were fantastic, sharing their knowledge about the Story of Exodus and the Torah. They learned a lot and had a wonderful day.

They also recently celebrated the Lunar New Year with lots of creative activities. The children learnt all about the animals in the story of the Great Race, they re-enacted the order using puppets.

The children enjoyed making good luck posters, lanterns, and lucky red envelopes. They looked at the traditions of this special festival through the stories, Dragons in the City, and the Runaway Wok.

They shared their learning with Class 2 during assembly





#### **Brereton C of E Primary School**

Before half term, they were very lucky as they received a loan of 34 knitted Bible scenes from St Georges United Reform Church in Hartlepool. Each class had the opportunity to explore the Bible scenes chronologically and talk about them and there was much awe and wonder





#### **Dodleston C of E Primary School**

Children recently took part in a Light and Colour Science Week.

To begin their week, Reverend Hazel led worship on the awe and wonder of light and how the concept of light is explored in the Bible; from God creating light on Day 1 to Jesus declaring, 'I am the Light of the World', in John's Gospel.





Throughout the week children worked as scientists engaging in fun enquiries to learn more about light and colour.

- •Class One, explored colour mixing and how rainbows are made
- •Class Two investigated shadows made their own shadow puppets and used their knowledge of light and colour to see if they could make a coloured shadow.
- Class Three were visited by an Education Officer from Chester Cathedral, who ran an 'Amazing Light' workshop. Children explored the properties of light, how the eye works and how Jesus is the Light of the World, guiding us on to do His work.

#### **Hartford C of E High School**

#### THE GREEN TEAM

"The earth is the Lords and everything in it, the world and all who live in it." Psalm 24:1



Our Form Council Reps. did a questionnaire and asked their Forms what positive changes they would like to see around the school. Our Year 10 Executive School Council then processed the results and discovered that the overriding thing was to make our school a greener, more eco – friendly place for generations to come.

Our Executive School Council then did a full school survey, looking at issues like energy, waste, food, hygiene, water, biodiversity, recycling and litter. As a result, they came up with a plan, which they presented

to our Head and Governors for approval and then to our whole school through assembly and tutor-time presentations.

We now have a newly formed Eco Committee, made up of students, staff and governors. We are seeking to eliminate the use of plastic cutlery and water bottles in our canteen and to have a separate 'paper bin' in each classroom, which is emptied daily by student monitors.

We seek to improve our outside environment by planting some flowers in house colours in raised beds; by leaving a patch of grass un-mown to increase the insect population, by planting a hedge to increase biodiversity and also by planting a school orchard/ copse, with saplings from the Woodland Trust and the Queen's Green Canopy.

We are also seeking to develop a school allotment, which will link into various departments (Food Tech, DT, Biology etc.) and produce food that can be used both by the Food Tech department, and also by needy families from both within the school and local community. We are seeking additional adult support for this project from the local church, thus strengthening our community ties.

It has been proven that spending time in the outdoor environment also improves mental, physical and emotional wellbeing, and as such we are hoping that students that are struggling mentally and emotionally will also benefit from this initiative. Watch this space...

#### Hyde St George's C of E Primary School

#### Family groups - EARTH, WIND, FIRE and WATER

This half term started with an art project to launch their new 'Family groups' which will replace their previous house groups, Derby, Chester, Lancaster and York. The Junior Leadership Team decided that they needed something more meaningful and family groups seemed more appropriate. They have also included all the school - Nursery, Reception, KS1 and KS2 where it was just KS2 before.

The process started by thinking about names for the family groups such as



authors, courageous advocates, local people, landmarks, etc. and this went to a whole school vote. The winning vote was the four elements, EARTH, WIND, FIRE and WATER. The children explained that they liked this idea because the elements linked to God's creation and there were many references to each of these in the Bible. They then thought it would be a great idea to produce a piece of artwork to represent each of the family group names. Each class split into their family groups to create their piece of artwork, using bible references for each of the elements. They were also inspired by the tapestries in St Alban's Cathedral, 'Elements in Salvation'.

#### Kingsley St John's C of E Primary School

Pupils have been studying Northwest Coast Art. It looks back at who the First Nations people were and their history. After having practised their skills and researched more about the importance of this artwork to the First Nations culture and its people, the children began to think about their community and how they could represent their world in the same style.

#### **Pott Shrigley Church School**

Like many schools across the country, they spent a week in February focusing on mental health and wellbeing, thinking about and exploring the theme of Growing Together. They thought that the theme fitted their chosen Christian Values, Koinonia, Compassion and Respect, particularly well. Their mental health ambassadors worked with members of staff to lead activities and a workshop which encouraged children to take care of their own mental health and wellbeing.



They also performed a whole school samba, made support balloons, enjoyed exploring our artistic talents using clay and went outside to enjoy nature.



## **Shocklach Oviatt C of E Primary School**

Pupils have been learning about diversity and celebrating differences. Pupils have been taught not to ignore differences but to appreciate them and celebrate them. When we celebrate our differences, it shows we care about each other.

There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. Galatians 3:28



As part of this topic children researched 'Chinese New Year' and found out all about the celebrations that are taking place this month. They were given opportunities to design their own project, choosing whether to design a menu, prepare a

shopping list, make a dragon, give a card, draw a tiger or make a lantern and they all produced their own posters. They finished the week-long celebrations with a parade and a Chinese banquet. The children were taught that there are many different events throughout the world which are important to different



cultures and religions. Celebrating together helps communities to come together to show love for each other.

Jesus said *Love one another*. He didn't say to love the ones who look like us, who act like us, or who speak as we do. He simply said to love. Loving is a *choice*. More on this to follow as we are looking forward to the 'love' themed virtual Ethos conference on February 14<sup>th</sup>.

#### St John the Evangelist C of E Primary School



Their vision is that 'Children are a gift from the lord,' from Psalm 127 v 3. In worship, they have been reflecting on their own gifts and how they would like to be the gift that keeps on giving.

They have, therefore, decided to do school council a little differently at St John's.

They are aiming to make changes within in their school community, so that the children can see change first-hand.

They will look at celebrating each other, which is why they have changed the name to GIFT team. They want the children to see their role within school as one that displays and shows off their Christian vision for the school

The GIFT team's first mission comes after a suggestion from Mr Jackson, the site manager, and they are going to start the term looking into what they can do to reduce plastic waste in and around school. The GIFT team are planning an assembly to deliver to the whole school and have already begun to make a difference to the school grounds by inspiring classes to clean up the woods.

#### Stretton St Matthew's C of E Primary School

Have been inspired by Chester Cathedral's Global Images of Christ exhibition. Combining RE and Art, each class were given a piece of artwork which challenged typical perceptions of Christ and instead looked at how he is depicted in other cultures.

Class R and Class 1 worked collaboratively to produce this piece inspired by Silvia Dimitrova's 'Miriam'. They used a variety of printing and collage techniques to create the different elements.



Year 2 were inspired by our own El Salvador Cross, which hangs in our school. These crosses are hand painted by a Latin American group. The children each created a small animal, house, person, or flower to represent the many creations.

Year 3 had the challenging task of creating a 3D sculpture which was inspired by Peter Eugene Bell's Christus Rex. They used fabric paint for the clothes and modroc to sculpt the hands, feet and face.



Year 4 used collage skills to re-create this beautiful stained glass window effect which was inspired by Mary DuCharme's 'Jesus'.

Year 5 were thrilled to hear from Lorna May Wadsworth herself, when they shared with her their work inspired by her painting 'Pink Christ'. Each child had a canvas which was then joined together to create these fantastic pieces.





Year 6 used ink pens to produce work in the style of Sophia Mison's 'Moari Jesus'. Whilst some children focused purely on the intricate patterns, others created whole pieces inspired by the beautiul artwork.



#### The Bishop's Blue Coat C of E High School

This term, students are `springing into social action` to support a range of charities voted for by Year groups. They launched their social action initiative through assemblies that focused on the South African concept of `ubuntu` (`humanity towards others`) and Jesus` teachings of putting love into action to improve the lives of others. Assemblies delivered during Children's Mental Health Week also reinforced the point that altruistic behaviour and showing compassion for others is one of the best ways that we can take care of our own mental and spiritual well-being. As the students progress through the spring and summer terms, they will `spring into action` for their charities by raising awareness and funds for them. Social action projects are being organised both at a tutor group and year group level and, in addition, planned non-uniform days will also be treated as social action and fundraising days.

## Witton Church Walk C of E Primary School

Staff, children, and families have had a fabulous two weeks in January exploring God's Big Story. The school were able to book a magical, engaging experience which consisted of thirty-three knitted scenes of prolific bible stories. Across the two weeks, all children from Nursery to Year 6 viewed the gallery of scenes and explored and developed a deep understanding of God's Big Story. They engaged in tasks to consider their wonders, to discuss the concepts within each scene and to share in their knowledge with one another. After the experience, all classes had the opportunity to engage in prayer spaces – reflecting on how God's everlasting love sits behind all aspects of the Big Story. Families and the community were invited to experience the Knitted Bible for themselves and to allow their child to share their learning.
