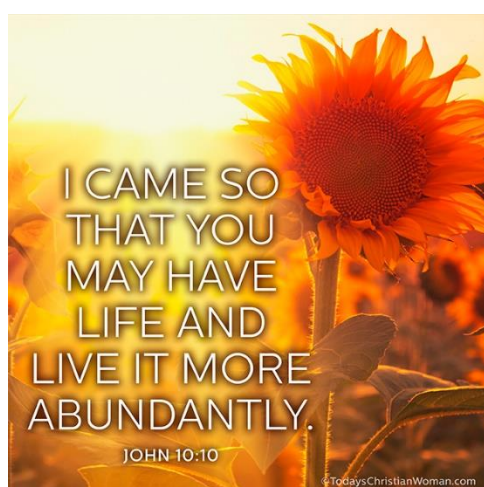

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Key changes to SIAMS

This month, the National SIAMS team from the Church of England have announced a new framework that will come into effect from September 2023. SIAMS is the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools, as part of section 48 of the Education Act 2005. The national team have described the new framework as ‘radically different, radically the same.’ It will continue to have a focus on the impact of the Church school's theologically rooted Christian vision in enabling pupils and adults to flourish. The approach, however will be different, with a much greater emphasis around the evidence of ‘impact’ rather than schools evidencing against lists of criteria. The context of the school will also play a much greater role than at present. One significant change is that inspections will no longer be graded and instead an overall judgement will be awarded. Trusts will also be held more accountable for their responsibilities for Church schools. Our diocesan team will be providing further details and information over the coming months through a range of briefings, courses, cluster meetings and forums (further details can be found on p.3) to support schools in preparation for these changes. Schools that are in the inspection window for this academic year, will continue to be inspected under the current framework.

Finally, a reminder that our Heads and senior leaders conference takes place on the 25th November, the theme is on the Church of England’s Vision for Education strand of Living Well Together. Tickets are still available and can be purchased through the link chesterdbe.co.uk/conference. We will be welcoming Nigel Genders, Chief Education Officer for the Church of England, and will hear from a national perspective, the key issues in education currently and within this context, how as school, church and community we can live well and flourish together. We look forward to you joining us.

Admissions for Aided schools and academies



Our admissions guidance has been updated following some adjudicator rulings that have been made this year. The latest guidance can be found here

Please ensure:

- Looked After Children also includes those who were in care overseas
- A clear definition of worship attendance, frequency and time frame with clear cut off. This definition must also be in your Supplementary Information Form (SIF)
- If you have criteria that includes attendance at worship you must have a Supplementary Information Form that allows for a tick box to confirm attendance (not a letter from clergy)
- The waiting list is kept until the 31st December and not the end of the autumn term.
- If you have a section on 'summer born children' rename to children educated outside their age group to include those who wish to start school early and those who wish to delay for reasons (e.g. medical) which is not to do with being summer born
- Make sure the map of any parishes is included with the policy

Please remember

- If there are any changes you must consult for a minimum of 6 weeks before the 31st January
- You will need to 'determine' the arrangements for 2024 by 28th February 2023 and send a copy to the DBE

Chaplaincy at Elworth Church of England Primary School

Over the past two years I have had the privilege of serving the children and staff of Elworth Church of England School as their school chaplain. My role is one which is distinctive and inclusive; meeting people where they are and accepting them unconditionally, my aim always being to share God's presence by my words and actions. The chaplaincy role is completely relational and depends upon the building of good relationships with our local families.

Part of my role has been to develop a team of young people known as the Worship Warriors. Together we have planned both collective and class worship, have monitored class reflection areas and have raised awareness of our termly Christian value projects. The Worship Warrior team is vital to the spiritual life of the school and it is wonderful to meet with them weekly and to discuss topical Christian issues.

Another aspect of my role as chaplain is to provide a listening ear where it is needed and I have been able to check in with pupils, staff and parents to provide pastoral support. A chaplain is always on the edge and in the centre; at the centre of school with a direct link to the senior leadership team but also one step removed from the school because of the link with the Church meaning that I can therefore be more impartial and take a 'wider' view of situations and reflect back with a more pastoral opinion.

One of the biggest privileges I have is to be able to pray for and with the school community. Sharing a daily thought and prayer has meant a lot to me and has helped me to build on relationships across the school.

As chaplain, I am actively involved in the planning and celebration of Christian festivals as part of the annual Christian calendar of the school. There has been scope to introduce some messy church style activities and also to be part of the school's termly Prayer Spaces days which involve a whole day of prayer activities and reflections together with the school children and staff.

Finally, I have been able to share with the school in various types of charity work. This term the focus has been upon Operation Christmas Child and also the collection of food donations for the Sandbach food bank.

In summary, the role of a chaplain is diverse and varied, always different from day to day but with God at the centre always.

News from Schools

Astbury St Mary



Children from our school joined with others on a pilgrimage to Chester cathedral. Children learnt about St Werburgh, dressed as a pilgrim and gave bread and money to the poor. They dressed as Benedictine Monks, took a vow of silence, ate bread, drank apple juice (not ale!) and listened to the story of the lost sheep. Children visited the children's chapel and learnt about prayer. They made a bracelet to represent the four different elements of the Lord's prayer and wrote prayers on leaves to put on a tree.



There was a fantastic teaching session on the organ with a demonstration of the sounds of the organ. To end the afternoon, children joined craft workshops making stained glass windows, tiles and mosaics. The final part of the day was a service in the cathedral and a presentation to the children from Bishop Sam. Astbury children loved looking at the stained-glass windows in the cloisters and particularly enjoyed finding the saints with their names!

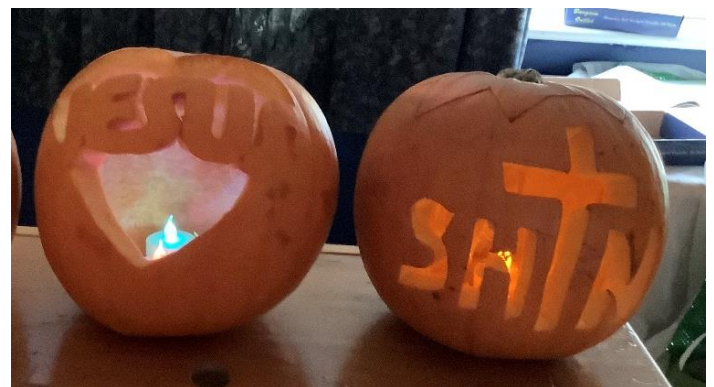

This term we have celebrated Harvest in Bunbury school with our annual Harvest Celebration Worship. For the first time since autumn 2019, we have been able to hold our service back in St Boniface church. We were delighted to welcome so many parents, carers, grandparents and relatives to the service and it was fantastic to see that the church was packed.



Throughout this half term the children have been thinking about Thankfulness through their weekly worships. Harvest is a time to thank God for all the gifts of his creation. During the service we thought about the story of Ruth and Boaz. In the Bible, God frequently reminds His people of the importance of taking care of those who are in need. The story of Ruth and Boaz is an example from the Old Testament where they both put other people first. We talked with the children about how we can do

the same today by adding a few items into the food bank box when we go shopping? Our harvest donations this year therefore went to our local foodbank and we had a fantastic amount of produce donated.



We continued through the service to think about Ruth and Boaz. Ruth was not wealthy like Boaz, but she gave something very important – she showed kindness to Naomi and stayed with her through a difficult time. With the children we thought about how we could show the Fruits of the Spirits in all we do so that we can live in peaceful world.

Each of our classes shared their thinking about what Thankfulness means to them. As we continue to live in uncertain times, we have been thinking about being thankful: by loving others, giving cheerfully, caring for creation and giving our time.

Worship at Bunbury is linked to the Christian Values and each half term the children look more closely at a particular value.



Retuning back to school in September we all looked at Thankfulness, what this meant to the children as well as stories within the bible. During the half term, different children are rewarded weekly for showing this Christian value in their everyday lives both within school and in the community. The children really enjoy this in-depth work on each of the Christian values and are always very able to demonstrate how they live their daily lives showing each of these values.

Crowton



This month, we had a wonderful Harvest celebration at Crowton Christ Church. It was lovely to welcome our new Reception children and their parents into our school family. Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 shared a beautiful poem about Harvest, Year 3 and 4 shared a small role play all about the harvesting process for farmers and finally, Year 5 and 6 shared a fantastic acrostic poem. The church was filled with joy and all children sang beautifully. Another huge thank you to all the donations from our Crowton family and friends.

Brooke in Year 4 has worked hard with her Beaver Colony to raise money for R.N.L.I by completing lots of jobs, like gardening, washing cars and walking horses. She managed to fundraise £50 to help save lives at sea. We are super proud of her at Crowton!



A popular and loved little boy who finished Crowton a few years ago. Here's Josh's Story: Back in April this year, I was in Year 8 and enjoying playing football. I started to feel tired and was getting pains in my leg and back. After a visit to the Doctors, blood tests, CT and MRI scans and a bone marrow test I was diagnosed with Leukaemia.

By the beginning of September I had already had 15 lumbar punctures and bone marrow aspirates, 64 rounds of chemo/immunotherapy during which I suffered a stroke caused by the toxic chemotherapy drugs. The list doesn't end there, I have also had 13 blood/platelet transfusions, 14 MRI/CT scans and spent over 50 nights in hospital. My treatment will take 3 years in total!

September was childhood cancer awareness month and I wanted to do something to raise money for two of the charities that had helped me, The Joshua Tree at Sandiway and Little Chics based at Alder Hey. I decided to walk or cycle one mile for every round of chemo/immunotherapy I had had, so 64 miles in total. By the end of September I had completed a total of 110 miles and raised an incredible £5500. The money will make a huge difference to both the charities and the families they support and thank you to everyone who sponsored me. Josh 💙

Lower Peover

Last month we took on our [Gold Ribbon Run](#) to raise funds and awareness for the Childhood Cancer and Leukaemia Group. We are pleased to announce that we raised £6015 for vital research with this wonderful charity.



Year 5 had a brilliant day at Chester Cathedral pilgrim day. We had guided tours around the cathedral where we dressed as monks and had a breakfast of bread and 'ale' (apple juice), learned all about St Werburgh and made prayer bracelets. We were treated to an organ demonstration and took part in lots of different activities such as making mosaics, sewing a pilgrim



pouch, designing a floor tile, learning a song with the choir and creating monks out of icing! Each child also added a piece of Lego to the huge Lego replica of the cathedral which was very exciting!

The week incorporated iSingPOP leading some sensational Songs of Worship at All Saints' Church culminating with two top quality concerts with singing and dancing at our Church which was packed to capacity (just like the good old days pre Covid!). Emma, our iSingPOP leader was absolutely amazing teaching songs that



will be firm favourites to raise the roof for many years to come I'm sure...! In between the songs, Emma's talent to relate to the children whilst talking about key Christian Values, helped our children to gain so much during this incredibly special week. Joyfulness (another of our school Christian values) abounded from start to finish!



In addition, our team of wonderful Church volunteers led by Sarah Holton our school and families worker set up and ran 3 prayer spaces on the EYFS playground, KS1 playground and KS2 playground. These mainly took place throughout the week at playtimes and lunch times and proved especially popular hives of activity and fun! What I loved was that our children had someone to listen to them and give them quality time to talk to them and pray with them. From bubble prayers, to flower prayers blooming in water and prayer ribbons adorning

our trees, the prayer spaces provided time to wonder, time to be peaceful and develop their spirituality.

Our Harvest Donations this year went to support our local foodbank 'The Pantry' ran by our Church where our Ethos Team took all our generous donations to the 'Connect Centre' in Marple showing KINDNESS to our community (another of our new Christian Values).

Moreton, Christ Church

Our school family is growing and we are overjoyed to have successfully opened a pre-school in September. It is joyous to see such young children thriving in their new learning environment.



As the EYFS department has grown, we have developed our outdoor provision to enhance it and to ensure that provision is progressive for the children as they journey through pre-school and FS2.

for the new school year.



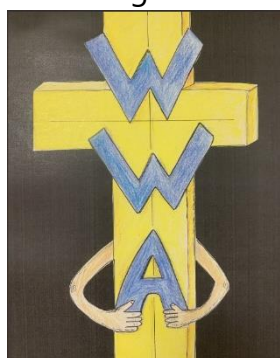

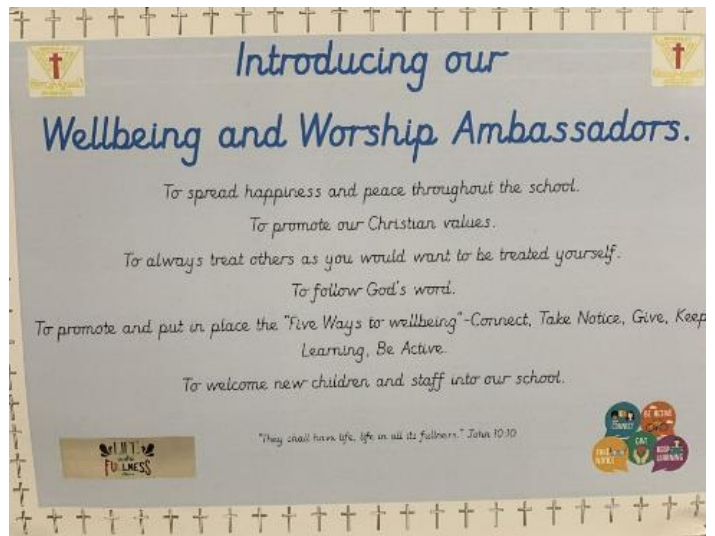
important process with the local community.

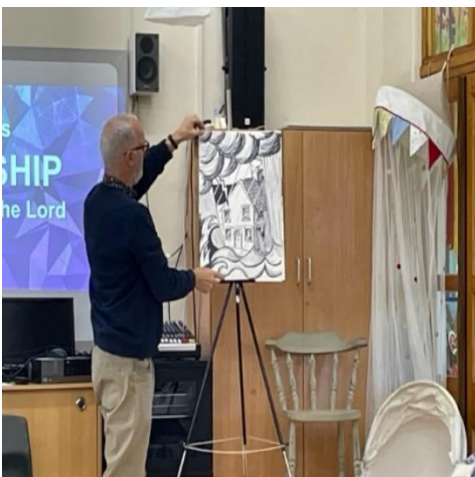
