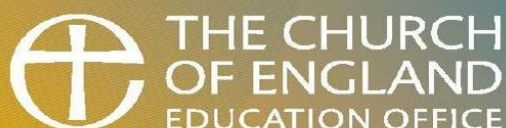

Family of Schools' Membership 2022-23

The DBE's Vision for Education is being deeply Christian and for the common good, in which our schools are communities that are loving in relationships, ambitious in aspirations and bold in actions. Our Family of Schools' membership seeks to reflect this commitment by providing a high-quality service which meets the distinctive needs of our Church schools and academies across the Diocese. Your subscription to the Family of Schools' membership is an important part of making this happen and allows us to provide an Education Team to support our schools. The quality of this partnership and the value that you hold in it, is reflected in every one of our 115 schools being a member of the Family of Schools.



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Membership entitles each school to a face to face session (up to a half day) by an officer or consultant providing advice, support or training in connection with Church school distinctiveness, Religious Education or collective worship. A core element of the DBE's support for schools is provided through our training and career professional development programme. The team have devised a comprehensive schedule for 2022-23 that supports leadership at all levels within the context of church schools, offering multi-session programmes, as well as stand-alone courses. Family of schools members receive a discount (up to 50%) on training courses and conference places. Becoming a Trauma Informed School - Emotion Coaching



Over the past year Mossley Primary School has been participating in the initiative - "Becoming a Trauma Informed School". This involved sessions delivered by experts in their field to help us better understand the full context of Trauma, how it manifests itself and how to support children who are experiencing it. The topics covered were: What is trauma and the neuroscience behind it? How bereavement and loss impacts.

How to support children with their learning, social interactions and behaviours. How to move towards a whole school approach to trauma informed practice.

Each session was followed up with a cluster meeting to discuss the expert session, share good practice and to build a network of support.

At Mossley we were keen to find a whole school approach that followed the principles of becoming a Trauma Informed School. Timothy 1:7 "For God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control".

We found an evidenced based programme – Emotion Coaching - which is based on the principle that nurturing and emotionally supportive relationships promote the best outcomes for children.

The whole staff were trained in this approach using an external provider. As we began to alter our practice in school we could see the positive impact it was having on relationships and therefore behaviours.

Alongside this several of our parents were expressing that they were having difficulties managing behaviours at home. How much greater could the impact be if home and school had the same approach? We offered Emotion Coaching training to all of our parents but then targeted specific families who had approached school for help. The turnout was greater than we could have imagined and larger than we had had before.

The impact for school and home has been tangible and measurable. More children are coming straight into school in a morning and are therefore ready to learn. Fewer children are late. Parents are feeling more in control of situations. From our point of view being part of the Trauma Informed School project has been the catalyst to real change at Mossley Primary.

Two networks are being run using national material from CEFEL (Church of England Foundation for Educational Leadership); one on the theme of [trauma informed practice](#) and the other on [visionary leadership of SEND](#).

There will be a mix of virtual (after school) national sessions, alongside locally-delivered 'daytime'/twilight sessions which will be led by our team and local leaders. The national sessions should hopefully include some inspirational national/international expert speakers.

We will be co-ordinating the networks for our Diocesan schools and at this stage, we are asking for expressions of interest (without firm commitment) from schools for either/both of the networks. The links above give more detailed information – there is a small cost charged by CEFEL of approximately £75 for each of the two year networks.

Christian Ethics of Farmed Animals Welfare

Last year we asked schools to get involved in an exciting project that we were undertaking in collaboration with the University of Chester/Aberdeen and other organisations including NATRE regarding Christian ethics in farming. There were two opportunities to get involved, one for schools and another for RE teachers. The schools were invited to work through the project developing an action plan in dialogue with the Research Team relevant to the school's context and interests. It is then planned that case studies will be produced at the end of the project highlighting good practice for dissemination to other schools. We have a variety of topics being explored from dairy farming to sourcing school dinners ethically. Tilston CE Parochial primary school shared some news about the project with us

Worship and Communion

Children from St Bridget's West Kirby sharing in Holy Communion

A number of years ago, our then incumbent of our parish, encouraged children in Year 4 to share in Holy Communion. This always proved to be a very special event filled with awe and fellowship. However, like many things in the past couple of years, this was hampered by the pandemic. As a school, we were faced with a problem, we had children in years 5 and 6 who had missed their opportunity to take part and we were very keen to involve Year 4 children as we had done in the past. But we kept coming back to a number of questions in our minds:

Who were we doing this for? Why were we doing this? When would children have further opportunities to join in Communion after the initial service? How could children and their families make an informed decision on whether sharing in the Communion meal was the right thing for them? And all these questions, before we'd even considered the logistics of "how" we would make this work and what we could do for those older children who had missed their chance due to Covid.



the children enjoyed them, plus the thematic approach allowed our children to make connections with other faiths and belief systems.

After time of thought and prayer, a plan revealed itself to us. We decided to utilise our RE lessons for all KS2 children and during the first half of the Summer Term we spent our RE lessons learning about the sacrament of Holy Communion. We explained this to our parents and informed them that when these lessons were complete, they would have chance to consider (as a family) if they wanted their child to receive Holy Communion. Our lessons covered themes of forgiveness, belonging and prayer within the sacrament of Holy Communion. We knew that we couldn't possibly explain everything about the Eucharist, but it would at least give the children some idea of what they were deciding upon.

The lessons were very successful and the

After 6 lessons in school, we asked our families if they would like to share in Holy Communion. There was a superb take-up, many children from Year 4, but also children from Years 5 and 6. The children had a final session in church with our Rector, Reverend Alex, where they learned about some of the more practical elements of the service and could ask questions to relieve their curiosity and any nerves!

At the end of summer term, we celebrated with two beautiful Holy Communion Services: one for our Year 4 children, accompanied by their Year 4 peers, their families, our Year 3 children and members of our church and similarly for our Year 5 and 6 children a couple of days later. These services really were a "team effort", with members of the church and teaching staff sharing in reading prayers and the school choir leading the singing. There was a very special feeling in church and many people (of all ages) commented on how glad they were to be part of it.

So what happens now? Our church's next All Together Worship (a monthly family service) is a very special one! The Bishop will be attending to confirm some young people...of course, all the families of our school are invited to attend and this will give further opportunity for those children who chose to receive Communion. They are welcomed to share in the meal again and again.

And for those children who didn't feel it was for them, the door is always open...what a wonderful demonstration of church and school working together, but also of an inclusive community where everybody is valued.

Links with schools in Melanesia and climate resources.

You may not be aware, but a number of our schools have links with schools in Melanesia, one of our linked dioceses. Covid has had an impact on both sides of the world and so some of the links have fallen away. I have been in contact with those schools that historically had a link and if you haven't had the chance to respond please do get in touch as we are hoping to help relaunch the links.

We are also hoping to encourage further links so if you would be interested in developing a link with a Melanesian school, please let me know and we will add you to the list.



In addition to this, the education arm of the Melanesian Mission UK that supports these links has been developing resources around climate change which is having a particular impact in Melanesia and will continue to do so. We have some schools who have offered to pilot them and so please keep a look out for these (if you would be willing to pilot the resources please also let me know). Further resources and videos are also planned in addition to those already on the MMUK website.

This is a great opportunity for your children to get to know children/students from across the globe, experience and understand their way of life as compared to their own and to become aware that actions that happen here have an impact on the climate for other nations that we don't necessarily see. It is not about charitable giving but about creating strong links, gaining a deeper understanding and thus an opportunity to help make a change working together. It is also a fantastic way of looking at global Christianity and how we worship in different communities.

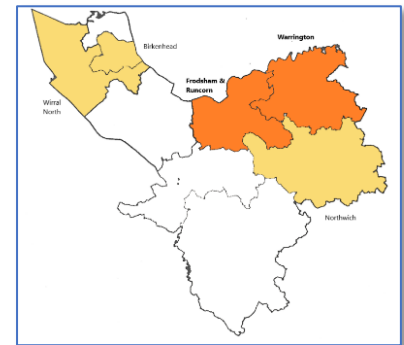

Governor Vacancies Appeal

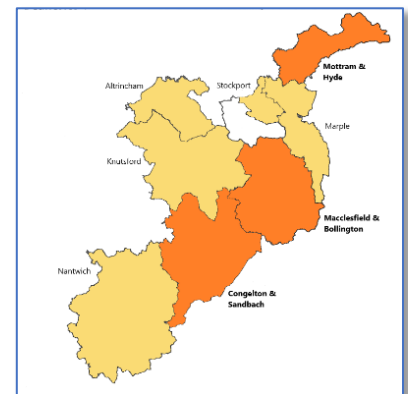
The appeal we launched at the end of last term has helped connect some of our schools to people who are interested in becoming governors, but there are still places available where you, or someone you know could support a local church school.
